### **HIGHWAY 1 ACCESS UPDATE: CALTRANS RAMP CLOSURE AT MORRO BAY BOULEVARD: FEB. 22-25**

Feb. 18, 2022

**What:** The California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) will close the southbound Highway 1 offramp at Morro Bay Boulevard from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. from Tuesday, Feb. 22 to Friday, Feb. 25, for critical maintenance work along southbound Highway 1 between Main Street and Morro Bay Boulevard.

Please plan extra time for commuting to accommodate for potential delays and the detour to Main Street, and please follow posted signage. During the Caltrans work hours, access to downtown Morro Bay and Los Osos will be available via Main Street and South Quintana Road. Outside of the Caltrans work hours, Morro Bay Boulevard access will be available at Highway 1.

South Bay Boulevard at Quintana Road will be remained closed through April 2022 for construction of the City of Morro Bay's Water Reclamation Facility (WRF) pipelines.

**When:** From Feb. 22 to Feb. 25, the community is advised to use Main Street for access to Morro Bay or Los Osos from Highway 1. South Bay Boulevard at Quintana Road will remain closed through April 2022.

#### **About the WRF:**

The WRF Program is the largest-ever City infrastructure program, and will meet state water and wastewater regulations, protect the environment and contribute a safe and reliable water source for Morro Bay's residents and businesses. The WRF Program involves replacing the City's existing wastewater treatment plant with an advanced water purification facility that will create a drought buffer.
